Research-led Education

- Our education is engaging and challenging, and underpinned throughout by research.
- Our students are active researchers, working sideby-side with world-leading academics and educators in small-group classroom and other settings.



But how does it actually work?

120 credits per year = 6 x 20 credit modules per year

Each degree programme has its own regulations – mixture of core modules and optional modules

Flexibility across disciplines: All students can take one 20 credit module from another programme per year



Research-led education

All programmes emphasise

- Research-led teaching
- Research-led learning
- Critical thinking
- Communication skills
- Independent study



UG Programme Types

- study one subject
- students can take modules in other subjects, but normally only one or two modules in the first year and only one or two modules over the other years

Joint Honours

- study *two subjects*
- students take modules in these two subjects, and cannot usually take modules in any other subjects

Combined Honours

- study two to four subjects
- students design an individual programme of study, taking modules in subjects from their own faculty and often from subjects in another faculty

Study Abroad or Placement

Single, Joint or Combined Honours can be a 4-year programme, with the 3rd year spent studying abroad or on a work placement

- Take relevant courses at an overseas university
- Assessment must be passed but does not count towards your Durham degree

Placement Year

- Professional-level work experience with a UK or overseas organization
- Assessment must be passed but does not count towards your Durham degree

Modern Languages Year Abroad

- Compulsory for Modern Languages & Cultures and for Chinese and Japanese Studies
- Study abroad or complete a work placement

Combined Honours in Social Sciences

Allows subjects in the Arts and Humanities to be taken alongside one or more subjects in the Social Sciences

Liberal Arts – our flexible Humanities programme

 The programme makes it possible for students interested in the Humanities to design their own degree, combining up to four subjects in the Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences

 Liberal Arts students study alongside Single Honours and Joint Honours students – working on the same topics, taking part in the same classes, and undergoing assessment in the same ways
